Public Hearing Proposed Local Law 1-2009 "For Flood Damage Prevention"

Town Clerk, Florence T. Santini, read the Public Notice, Notice is attached to minutes

Public Comment:

George Lombardi: Does this have to do with those maps FEMA came up with almost a year and a half ago? Saying that you had to pass this thing by February, and we had no money to look into these map changes, Port Jervis did and spent some money on it. Is this involved with this map thing? **Gary Flieger:** We don't have a five-minute rule for this because it's a public hearing; there is a flood map, the flood map affects this, but this isn't connected to the flood map.

George Lombardi: I see Wayne is here, I 'd like to know about the County adopting that FEMA map too, I don't know if Wayne knows about it. Also, if the town does not adopt this then the residents will not be able to obtain flood insurance for their homes. If the town doesn't pass this people will not be allowed to buy flood insurance and that can't be, and I'd also like to know where the County is on adopting those maps. Right now we're dealing with maps from 1986 that are completely out of whack, and if you go get a mortgage and you're in that zone they make you get flood insurance, whether it ever got water or not. Viola Sinsabaugh read the law out loud. **George Lombardi:** Last summer I brought up about a tree that fell, nobody cared, I brought up to Gary a couple of weeks ago someone cut down a big tree on the river, they took all the logs, all the brush and put it along the side of the river, so all these things they're putting in there about human health and what not, that's all bologna, what's the town going to do, the town has no money to do anything itself.

Dan Witt: Unlike George I don't want to take the hit on my taxes, I want to protect my house, and I did some research and the new maps are out, I don't know if you folks have seen them or not, they're going to be approved allegedly by FEMA on August 3, 2009, and it places some areas that you would not expect to be in the flood plain are in the flood plain, and some that you would expect to be there are not there. Let's not kid ourselves, flood insurance doesn't protect the homeowner it protects the banks, so from the homeowners standpoint I'd like to see us take a look at this so that if there is flood insurance out there available that if you are not in the flood plain now and you are put in a flood plain you're grandfathered so you don't have to pay the \$3,500 that you're talking about. If you don't do it and it means that people can't get flood insurance on their homes then all the property is worthless; keep that in mind because I don't know too many people that will take the gamble along Oakland Valley Road or in Myer's Grove or down at the bridge down there, to buy a home, scenic view or not, without flood insurance.

Public Comment – 3 Minutes Agenda Items Only:

Louise Vandemark: Just out of curiosity we have an executive session again and I just want to make sure we're going in for the right reasons okay, that's all. So you can you tell me why you're going in?

Liam O'Neill: Discussion of Office Personnel. Louise Vandemark: Well the last time you went and you shouldn't have so every time you have that on there I'm going to ask. Gary Flieger: We're going in there to discuss office personnel.

Glen Plotsky: You're going in to seek the opinion of legal counsel and that's all you need to say.

George Lombardi: Under New Business, what's DCO? Viola Sinsabaugh: Dog Control Officer. George Lombardi: Oh ok, so you're working on that, did you fix his van? Is he ready to work? Gary Flieger: Yes, we're all set with that; this is more about his van. George Lombardi: Now, these fire inspections, this building department has taken a beating over the last year on personnel; on fire inspections are they supposed to be done once a year? Gary Flieger: It's a yearly thing on commercial buildings, and there's about 65-70 of those on the books. George Lombardi: Has he been able to keep up on this? Viola Sinsabaugh: No. Gary Flieger: Yes and no. George Lombardi: The question about no is, if he can't do it is that leaving the town liable for these places where people go in as the public? Gary Flieger: He's doing the church, the firehouses, they are all subject to fire inspections and they are the lowest... George Lombardi: According to what you just said, those places require it, those 70 places should be inspected every year, you shouldn't pick out a church or a bigger place for the public, in other words that building department should have enough employees where Bob should have enough time to do those fire inspections. Let's say he doesn't do one in two years and there's a fire, who's liable? That's a question for you to think about.

Gary Flieger: What we're doing is the Town of Deerpark invites public comment and suggestions in regards to a project to be considered for funding under the Orange County Community Development Block Grant Program of 2009 in the amount of \$125,000, the public hearing will be held on the 27th day of May 2009 at 6:00PM at the Town Hall. The project proposals are due to the Orange County Community Development Office on or before May 29, 2009. We have two projects that we've got open; I'm going to write them both up so that I've got them both covered. The one that we're looking to do is the paving in the Painted Aprons development and the other one is the paving on the Upper Brook Road, those are the two projects that we've got out there. The Painted Aprons is the highest priority of the two.

Old Business:

Resolution for Fees for Fire Inspections

Gary Flieger: We're not really ready to bring that up, I think there has to be a lot more discussion, same as we had a two lot subdivision that we brought up, it really opened up a really good can of worms, and there's a lot of discussion and research that needs to be done still. We're not dropping this; we're just going to continue to do some more research.

Department Head/Committee Reports:

Ed Hughson: Gave a report, copy of the report is attached to the minutes.

Note: Port Orange Road is now Open again; and I will not be here at the next regular meeting, I will be away at Highway School from May 31st through June 2nd, I will try to get Bob over here to give a report for me, if not I'll have one at the following meeting.

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Charles Carlsen: At the last meeting recommended approval of the Police Commission that the Officers have new uniforms starting in June, at our last Police Commission meeting it was informed to us by the Police Chief that the Sergeants, Lieutenants, and Detectives would care to be in their current uniforms rather than go to new uniforms, after a lengthy discussion the commission voted on it and approved the amendment that the Sergeants, Lieutenants and Detectives stay in the current uniforms. During the month of April there was 291 calls for assistance, 12 motor vehicle accident reports, 22 arrests and 67 summons', the vehicle usage was 16,190 miles, we have a new Police Commissioner, Mr. Bruce Dryden, and if it's at all possible if he could take his oath this evening so that we could go ahead and do the fingerprinting and background and get him to be a voting member as soon as possible and that would more or less bring us up to full. The only other thing the police commissioners have is they have asked me to find out about a towing policy that we wrote and submitted to the town and we never heard anything back on that. Gary Flieger: I've got it in the office here, I'd like to sit down with Mr. Bavoso and go over it, I just have to get an appointment to do so. Charles Carlsen: Okay, and our next meeting is June 11, 2009 at 7:00PM at Building #2.

Liam O'Neill: The uniforms, does that mean that they are not getting any new uniforms at all this year?

Charles Carlsen: No, they have a uniform allowance, and June 15, 2009 the line staff with all the officers, they are going into the new uniforms, which is out of their own pocket, there is no cost at all to the town. The current uniforms that the officers are wearing now, these are the uniforms that the Sergeant, Lieutenant and Chief want to stay in the same uniforms.

Karl Brabenec: I know with the resolution that we passed it was a cost saving measure, I think, I'm still a little confused, this board authorized to change all the uniforms over and now we're sticking with some individuals with the old uniform, you know what I'm saying? How come that shouldn't be a board decision as well?

Viola Sinsabaugh: I had asked the same question as a matter of fact I attended the meeting I had brought up that the board should approve that, it's not a board decision, we do the budget, Mr. Plotsky I believe what you had said was that we could leave that to the decision of the commission on the uniforms.

Gary Spears: Why don't we just amend the resolution?

Motion to amend resolution

Motion made by Gary Spears, 2nd by Viola Sinsabaugh, to amend the resolution regarding police uniforms that we allow the Sergeants, Lieutenants, and Detectives to retain their old uniforms.

Discussion: Karl Brabenec: The only reason I'm asking about this is that I think that especially a police department they should have all the same uniforms, it shouldn't be one group of people having an old set of uniforms and another style for another unit, that kind of thing, I think it should be the same, so that's why I would vote no on this.

Gary Flieger: You could also look at it as your leadership has got a different uniform than your line people and that's basically what you did here, which would give them better recognition.

Flo Santini: I got certificates from the training that Judy Kehlenbeck and Matthew Zacharia took at Office of Real Property. Also I'd like to remind people that I have the box for food collection for Feed the Need in my office, they'll be collecting all week and I think they pick up on Friday so if anybody has any food that they would like to drop off it'll be there until Friday. I went over to Orange County, to the emergency management, that's where they made our maps so I have the zoning maps, the fee did increase to \$5.00 so I'd like to know, I'd need a motion to change the amount that we do charge, we normally have charged double in the past years. Gary Flieger: You're purchasing them for \$5.00, so what you're suggesting is, the common practice in the past, is doubling it, so now you're looking at going to \$10.00. Flo Santini: Yes, or if you want to go to \$8.00 it's the Board's discretion, I just need to know before I start selling them. We discussed Bruce Dryden, I talked with the Police Commission so he's going to get going on that to become a police commission. Board of Elections called and they asked to have permission to have election classes Thursday June 25th 9am-12pm and Thursday July 23rd 6pm-9pm, so I need a motion on that to let them do that.

Motion to authorize use of Town Hall

Motion made by Karl Brabenec, 2nd by Gary Spears, to authorize the Board of Elections to hold their Election Inspector Training Classes at Town Hall on Thursday June 25, 2009 from 9am-12pm and on Thursday July 23, 2009 from 6pm-9pm.

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Flo Santini: Also, I'd like the board to know I have a Town Clerk's meeting on Wednesday, it's up in Liberty so I'll be leaving early, I've got an appointment before that and then I'll be out Thursday and Friday I have little procedure that I have to have done so I'll be out two days, so if anybody needs me I'll be here from now until about 9am Wednesday morning. I know everybody has looked at it and everybody knows about but no one has mentioned Port Jervis, Tri-23, it's a very delicate situation, Mrs. Vandemark has been with us from the beginning, if they get evicted somebody better make sure the cable company's stuff is there for us to go live, that they don't walk off with our stuff, I don't know how it's processing.

Public Comment – 5 Minutes Any Subject

Louise Vandemark: Two meetings ago we spoke about the telephone vote and that was finally resolved, I was told at that time that it didn't cost the town money, that no one got paid, well in the meantime I did a FOIL, because you know I FOIL everything, if I want to know something I'm going to find out, well I found out people did get paid for that day, they used their own time, but they got paid for the day. I am not upset that people used their own time, there's no problem in doing that, I didn't like the way you did the vote and I want that clearly understood, I did not like it, I didn't like that it took four months to finally get the vote in public, but I also want it in the minutes the people did get paid for that day, we did not save the town thousands of dollars. Because they received their paychecks, they took some time, whatever, I just want that in the records that it didn't save the town thousands of dollars and people did get paid.

Lee Space: With reference to the new dog catcher, what good is a dog catcher if nobody knows we have one, so maybe somebody could put something in the newspaper stating that we have one what his name is where he can be reached, so on and so forth. Gary Flieger: It's the same number that we've been using and we've always had the position in place and that number was... Lee Space: We just haven't had a dogcatcher in place for a while. Gary Flieger: The dog catcher's position was covered by the police department when we didn't have one to answer a call, and that's the same way it's going to happen now, if this gentleman is at work or out of town or whatever it's going to be the same number, nothings changed, he doesn't have a new number or anything like that. Lee Space: I realize that nothing's changed but it would be nice to the citizens of Deerpark if we introduced him. Karl Brabenec: With the Board's permission I'll put a news release on the website and I'll forward it to your office and you can ship it out if you want.

Bill Crown: I want to know where the money went, that the town was saving on employees when they closed down the town here. I guess they got paid right? The comment was made that the place was closed down and the employees didn't get paid right? I just want to know where the money went because now we know that they did get paid right? Okay. I want to thank Karl for trying to work for the taxpayers, and I'll let the town employees thank the rest of you because it appears that's who you're working for. I have a question, you might have went over this, on this deficit there was a comment from Mark House that we can only spend the cash that we have on hand, is that correct? That you can only spend what money you have on hand in your budget, is that correct? Viola Sinsabaugh: That's what you should do. Bill Crown: Then Mr. Brabenec makes a comment that the budget deficit for last year totaled \$868,000, and property tax revenue receiving this year is going towards paying the bills left over from last year. So it looks to me like you took the money allocated for 2008 and paid the bills that was from 2007. That's pretty illegal, wouldn't you say? It is illegal, I'm telling you. As far as the FEMA money, \$300,000 in reimbursement for flood damage, now for reimbursement it would mean that you had to spend that \$300,000, so somebody spent \$300,000 they didn't have. FEMA money is the most simplest thing in the world and the only reason you didn't get it is because of laziness.

Jane Garvey: These fire inspections that the building inspector has to do, is this something new? NO. Has it increased tremendously? Do they all have to be done at the same time? No. Have a year to do it.

Closing Comments from the Board

Karl Brabenec: The Community Development lunch is coming up next Wednesday at the Port Jervis Country Club from 12pm-2pm. I want to thank Dave Hoovler, Gary Spears, who have put a lot of work and effort into it, they have raised closed to \$1,600 from businesses around the County and some local businesses as well to pay for the lunch, the funds are being managed by the town bookkeeper in an account at TD Banknorth and that is going fine. It's going to be a great event, if you are a business owner or you're interested in opening a business I would encourage you to come to that lunch. Also, we are doing a meeting tomorrow night just to go over the lunch, make sure all the I's are dotted and T's are crossed, so it should be a short meeting. Also I wanted to remind everybody don't forget to vote tomorrow for the school board elections.

Liam O'Neill: An opinion of yes will save you money. I don't quite understand how, but a yes vote will save you money. Also, thank you for the work that people have done in advance to try to manage this Tri-23 fiasco. Do we know how much is in the trust and agency account, we talked about getting that, can we make sure we can get that information.

Viola Sinsabaugh: Just a reminder on the school vote, I'm not telling you how to vote but you should get out and vote.

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Gary Flieger: The fire inspection fees, the building inspector actually goes out and evaluates, he makes sure the high priorities like the Comfort Inn, O'Dell's, he puts them on the top of the list of making sure that those are up to speed, a church that has a luncheon once in a while he goes in, but there's no way he has the time to take and get them all in right now.

Viola Sinsabaugh: That department does need help. Gary Flieger: And it's not the going out and doing the inspection, it's the paperwork, the reports that have to be filed with that.

Karl Brabeneck: I just had a question that just came to mind concerning the building inspector's office, there's a sign posted on the door that the office is open only from 8-2 and I know that we have town hall open from 8-4 so I don't know why it's 8-2, that's my first question and second doesn't the town board have to approve hours for a department?

Viola Sinsabaugh: Okay, number one, everybody on this board knows why, you know why don't try to act like you don't know why the office is only open those hours, you have a building inspector who comes in at 6 or 7 in the morning and is working in the office and has to go out and do his job. This board did not want to get any extra help until some things were done with the personnel policy, and the part time clerk can only work so many hours, that is what is stated as her part time job, and I said this, don't start barking when that office is closed because there's no one in there to handle the job, be ready for it, I said that. So we don't have the staff to work the amount of hours in that office. Gary Flieger: And this is common practice over the last couple of years when we don't have the staff in that office it does shut down and it does have a procedure that does work where you can pick up applications in the door, if your permits are filled out they're there, some of the calls are referred back to my office, I take care of them from there. Karl Brabeneck: That shouldn't be done.

Viola Sinsabaugh: That shouldn't be done, that office should be running itself and it should have the proper staff.

Gary Flieger: I agree I don't want to handle it. Viola Sinsabaugh: That is the only department in this town hall that does not have the proper staff and it's needed and when I hear 'oh with the amount of work now' or 'everything's so low' and other comments like that my suggestion is sit your body in the office for a day or two and see what goes on in that office, I have done it, I know what goes on, that office needs help and until this board can do something about it the office will remain closed at times because there's no one there to man it. Karl Brabeneck: Whose decision was that?

Gary Spears: To make the corrections, the board did not cut hours, the office still has the exact amount of part time workers as it had when this issue came up, she was illegally working more hours. There is a part time position that is wide open that has not been filled that has been budgeted for, so the facts are on the table. So if that position is filled the office could be open from 8-4. Viola Sinsabaugh: Right, but weren't we going to work on the personnel policy first before we did anything?

Gary Spears: We've been working on the personnel policy forever, there is two 20 hour part time positions available and budgeted for that, what we do or not is immaterial, but I just want to make the corrections for the minutes. We have not cut hours and there is budgeted enough help to keep the office open. Viola Sinsabaugh: We did cut the extra hours that she was working, she was working more than her 20 hours, she was doing that. Gary Flieger: And it needed to be done.

Viola Sinsabaugh: She was working added hours which is not to be on a part time thing which I understand, she was doing that out of necessity. Gary Spears: Because another part timer was not hired. Viola Sinsabaugh: That's right.

Karl Brabeneck: So again who made the decision to make it 8-2? Gary Flieger: How would you like to make it?

Karl Brabeneck: 8-4. So I'll make a motion that the Building Inspector's Office is open from 8-4.

Gary Flieger: And who's going to man it? Viola Sinsabaugh: Are you going to man it? Karl Brabeneck: I'm not a salaried employee like the Building Inspector. The Building Inspector, if he has to work over 40 hours he gets paid for 40 hours but he works over 40 hours if he has to, that is part of the job, it is part of the job, any salaried employee, to man the office correctly, any salaried employee has to do that, if it's an emergency basis they have to work more than 40 hours,

unfortunately we don't have another part timer to fill that and that might spur some movement on that end so... I would like to move that that office is open at a minimum from 8 in the morning to 4 in the afternoon. Gary Flieger: That's already on the books, it's supposed to be open those hours anyway. Karl Brabeneck: So why is it say 8-2, who made the decision to make it 8-2? Gary Flieger: Because we need someone in there. Karl Brabeneck: My question is not being answered, who made the decision to keep the office open from 8-2, it wasn't the town board. Viola Sinsabaugh: The decision was made probably by the Building Inspector who runs that department, for his help to be there for the few hours that this board has allowed the 20 hours that's divided over a week and the building inspector is not a job like you get up in the morning and go to your job and you come home at whatever time, you may work an 8-4 job or a 9-5 job, the building inspector is also out when there is something to be done, somebody is having concrete come in at a certain time and the building inspector has to be there, it's done early in the morning, he goes out at that time to do his job, that department is not on an actual set time.

Karl Brabeneck: That's fine, but here's the problem, the board was never notified that there was going to be an issue, no memo, nothing, there was just a sign on the door because of the town board's cuts in hours we're going to 8-2. I got a phone call from another department head telling me about that. Liam O'Neill: Gary Flieger, can you request of the Building Inspector that he write a memo to the board explaining the office hours that he feels he needs just because it is protocol that the board approve the hours if they are different from the normal 8-4. Gary Flieger: I'd be glad to; I'll definitely sit down with him tomorrow. Karl Brabeneck: Furthermore I want that sign to be removed immediately from that door and that office is to be open 8-4. Viola Sinsabaugh: No, I will not go for that, you're trying to micromanage a department that does not help; I will not go for that. Karl Brabeneck continued on and on about this issue, if anyone wishes to hear the remainder of this discussion the tape will be on file in the town clerk's office for six months.
